Learning at its best

- We have a diverse range of undergraduate routes, including the Bilingual Program, Honors Program (one of only a few in Canada), Collaborative Program and After Degree Program.
- State-of-the-art Simulation Centre and SMART Technology equipment are in all learning labs.
- Students can work as Undergraduate Nursing Employees or Healthcare Aides during their programs.
- Our faculty members are leading nursing researchers, which means you will study in an environment that allows you to engage in the development of new nursing knowledge.

Our Approach

The Faculty of Nursing uses a learner-centered approach that develops critical thinking skills and innovative problem solving with applied learning opportunities starting in the first year.

Our Tech

The **Nursing Simulation Centre** supports immersive learning in a safe environment and provides learning experiences that range from introductory to highly complex situations, including ones that may be difficult to experience in clinical settings (e.g. cardiac arrest or birthing of a baby).

The **High Fidelity Simulation Suite** includes a variety of simulated human patients of various ages, including a new pediatric model.

Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BScN)-**Collaborative Program**

Overview

- Primarily for high school graduates or those who have some postsecondary education
- 4-year full-time program
- Campus options: University of Alberta North Campus in Edmonton, Red Deer Polytechnic (formerly Red Deer College), Keyano College (Fort McMurray) or Northwestern Polytechnic (formerly Grande Prairie Regional College)

We specifically designate seats each year for First Nations, Métis and Inuit students, who can also enter this program through the University of Alberta's Transition Year Program (TYP). uab.ca/typ

Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BScN)—Bilingual Program

Have you thought about a degree in both of Canada's official languages?

Overview

- Help meet demand for bilingual healthcare workers
- Unique career paths outside of the traditional hospital setting, including: the military, corrections, non-governmental organizations, international or travel nursing, or roles within the federal government

Students have the opportunity to study at both **North Campus and Campus Saint-Jean. This** partnership between the Faculty of Nursing and Faculté Saint-Jean is funded in part by Health Canada and in part by the Province of Alberta. Upon completion, the Bilingual program is recognized on the student's parchment.

Program Highlights

- Smaller cohorts allow you to better know your fellow students and professors and to receive more support
- Additional scholarships are available to bilingual nursing students
- 60% of classes are in French, encouraging the ongoing development of oral, written and clinical communication in French
- Opportunities for clinical placements in both French and English, plus increased guidance for completing clinical experiences in rural placements and with Francophone agencies across the province
- La Centrale (CSJ's success centre) and North Campus student services offer extensive support in specific subjects, as well as in the French and **English languages**

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

Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BScN)—Honors

Nursing students in the High Fidelity Simulation Suite in ECHA where they learn to care for a variety of simulated human patients that are being controlled by an instructor.

Overview

- There are two pathways to enter the Honors program:
 - BScN Collaborative Honors Program (non-direct entry)
 - After Degree Honors Program (non-direct entry)
- Participate in scholarly and research work to enrich your undergraduate program experience
- Gain in-depth knowledge in an area of research and be mentored by a Faculty of Nursing researcher while carrying out an honors research project
- Support in presenting research and writing for publication

Who should apply to this program?

- Students who demonstrate excellence in their previous coursework
- Students interested in strengthening their capacity for evidence-based practice and in pursuing research or teaching as future career choices

The program helps to prepare students to ask and answer important research questions, to engage in the research process, to provide evidence-based nursing practice in health care settings and to facilitate the transition from undergraduate to graduate studies in nursing.

Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BScN)—After Degree Program

Overview

- For students who already hold a recognized degree in any field of study
- 2-year full-time program

Upon graduating, After Degree students are uniquely positioned to access the wide range of opportunities that having a nursing degree offers — including clinical roles in hospitals and the community, research, education, leadership and management.

The Faculty of Nursing has a Global Nursing Office (GNO) that collaborates with students and faculty to:

- Provide leadership in globally minded nursing education, research and service
- Promote international, national and local mobility and outreach
- Foster the development of global citizenship



We believe a nursing education isn't complete without the real-life experiences and knowledge only gained by working in clinical settings.

As a U of A student, you'll learn firsthand what it takes to be a competent, compassionate nurse through regular and varied clinical placements. Working alongside community partners, students are immersed in the world of health care.

Preceptorships

During your final year of study, you'll be assigned a preceptor(s) or a Registered Nurse (RN), at the site of your final placement, who you'll work alongside to build on previous clinical and lab learning.



Your clinical placement and preceptorship will take place in a variety of settings, and hours are often divided. Day shifts typically run from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., while evening shifts run from 3 p.m. to 11 p.m.

Most group placements occur in the local Edmonton and area hospitals in non-critical areas such as medicine, surgery, cardiology, neurology and more.

Additionally, some placements occur in assisted and supporting living facilities and public health centres. Students in the community health course may actively work with a number of local not-for-profit organizations that support historically, persistently or systematically marginalized groups and work to address barriers to equity.

The majority of preceptorship placements occur in the same areas as group placements; however, there is more opportunity for diverse placements in preceptorship including placements in:

- Critical care areas such as the emergency room, operating room, intensive care unit
- Pediatrics units
- Ambulatory clinics
- Out-of-province placements
- Rural communities: nurses in rural practice often work in different areas of the hospital, and this experience can provide students with a range of practice in different areas

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Casper Assessment

A Critical Part of Your Application Process

Most applicants applying to Bachelor of Science in Nursing programs at the University of Alberta are required to complete the Casper test as part of their application.

The Casper test is a 100- to 120-minute online, open-response situational judgment test.

It is a standardized online assessment of non-cognitive skills, interpersonal characteristics and personal values and priorities that we believe are important for successful students and graduates of our program. The Casper test will complement the other factors that we use for applicant review and evaluation, including equity-based review of applications.

Students in the Bilingual Program have the option to take the test in either French or English.

Self-Declared First Nations, Métis and Inuit applicants are not required to submit a Casper score to be eligible for admission.

- * Only one of Mathematics 30-1 or Mathematics 30-2 can be used for admission.
- ** Students must obtain a grade equivalent to C+ or higher as determined by the grading scale in the Faculty of Nursing at the University of Alberta. Students with grades of CR will not be considered as meeting the C+ requirement.
