

Message from the AWE Working Group

Arts Work Experience (AWE) continues to evolve to better serve and support students. In June, 2023, a new Work Experience Coordinator joined the team, allowing for an increase in career education offerings and a renewed focus on employer relations. We also started using WaitWell, an appointment booking system that drastically reduced inefficiencies and provided students with full control over their own appointment bookings. In a post-COVID landscape, students continue to seek both in-person and online opportunities and in response, the AWE team created more opportunities for students to access services and attend events and workshops in a variety of formats.

As one of the cornerstones of our Faculty's Experiential Learning offerings, AWE continues to provide diverse and enriching opportunities that allow students to put their skills and knowledge to work outside of the classroom. As AWE continues to grow, we continue to improve our program and service offerings to serve our students. Background

Arts Work Experience (AWE) began as a pilot program in 2011 and has since grown significantly with more students joining the program and securing work terms every year.

AWE provides students with the opportunity to apply their academic knowledge in workplace scenarios and to develop professional experience related to their long-term career goals. The work experience model puts the responsibility on the student to set learning objectives, to provide a valuable contribution to an employer and to reflect on how the experience will impact their long term career management.

Arts Work Experience programs connect students, employers and community as a first step in achieving individual, educational and organizational success. It launches Arts students as they begin a journey of innovation, problem solving and the exploration of engaged citizenship and career opportunities.












Work Terms Secured: By Department

Year in Review

This year, we welcomed Lindsay Hennessey, adding another Work Experience Coordinator to the team. With her support, we were able to address outstanding program goals that would not have been possible otherwise. We were able to divide up student assignments more evenly, resulting in an increased capacity to provide individualized support to each AWE student. Additionally, we were able to take a more active role in employer relations, developing best practices with the Career Centre to provide more employment opportunities to students and connect with prospective employers.

We also continued offering group intake orientation sessions. We were able to offer more online and in-person sessions, eliminating the need for individual orientation sessions. These group sessions provided more time to plan and facilitate more workshops, such as Career Vision Board Planning, Avoiding Job Scams and a Workplace Etiquette.

The Communications and Program Support Intern encouraged more students to submit "Follow Me to Work" reels for our Instagram account than ever before, resulting in more followers and a higher level of social media engagement from prospective and current AWE students. They also enhanced the AWE Student Stories website with updated branding and reorganized the content in a more user friendly way. Here are the highlights from this year:

Administration

- > Implemented WaitWell to manage student appointments more efficiently
- > Began revising and updating the AWE Student Handbook to better communicate policies and procedures
- > Developed an online midterm and final evaluation process for tudents on work terms and their supervisors
- > Established job posting best practices with the U of A Career Centre and took the lead on approving and adding positions to the AWE Job Board

Career Education

- > Implemented a Pre-employment eClass for newly admitted students to ensure that students were well-equipped to make the most of our programs and services
- > Created branded career resources to supplement advising services
- > Initiated the development of an international student orientation presentation
- > Continued to offer individualized Advising Appointments and Career Coaching sessions to students and initial resume reviews by the AWE Communications and Program Support Intern

Diversiy and Inclusion

- > Continued to partner with the Indigenous Student Engagement & Recruitment Specialist to offer drop-in resume and cover letter support
- > Collaborated with the Work-Integrated Learning Working Group to streamline international student advising, especially around work experience tuition as it applies to tuition guarantees

Communications and Marketing

- > Featured 16 student stories and 6 Reels on Instagram with a unified branded template and a focus on a day-in-the-life of students on work terms.
- > Reformatted and reorganized the AWE Student Stories website and added a Tip of The Week Archive page to enhance the user experience and increase student engagement
- > Updated the branding and templates for both AWE Weekly Updates and AWE News e-newsletters

Employer Relations and Partnerships

- > Updated the Memorandum of Understanding with the U of A Career Centre to take a more active role in employer relations and posting positions relevant to Arts students
- > Hosted an employment information session with the Government of Alberta and Correction Services Canada with a focus on Indigenous recruitment

Looking Ahead - Goals for 2024 - 2025

- > Create an online community for students on work term to connect with each other and share experiences and advice
- > Migrate current eClass materials to Canvas and leverage new technology to increase and enhance student offerings
- > Cultivate relationships with new employers to create more employment opportunities for AWE students
- > Increase student enrolment and work term numbers for international students
- > Provide information about AWE for department websites
- > Lead the faciliation of the Master of Arts Policy Studies Practicum program
