
The next meeting of the Book Club will be held on Wednesday,

The University Club decided to charge us \$150 for the use of the Papaschase Room and we had to

guarantee at least 20 attendees at \$33 per person. ARAS found these conditions unacceptable so here we are. The lunch will be catered by Upper Crust and will consist of soup, sandwiches, dessert squares and coffee (decaf) at a cost of \$20. Paid parking will be available under University Terrace and is accessible from 112 Street by turning onto 83 Avenue and driving east until turning left into the parkade. The pay machine is located close to the elevator which will take you to the first floor. Room 1-38 is at the far east of that floor. You should be targeting an arrival time of 11:30am with lunch to begin at around 11:45am and the speaker starting his presentation at around 12:15pm.
