


Helen Zhang has joined our team as Program and Outreach Lead, while Zenashe Aytenfisu has become a permanent staff member as a Partnership Coordinator, and Julianna Barabas has joined our team as a Partnership Coordinator while Alyssa McPhail is on leave. Helen has a graduate degree in Library and Information Sciences, Zenashe has a Master of Arts in History and Development Studies, and Julianna has extensive not-for-profit experience (e.g. *Meals on Wheels*) and university experience. Despite the transitions and learning, CSL had another productive and successful year.

We have expanded our student equity bursaries, enabling well over 300 students to receive \$1000 each this past year in recognition of their contributions to CSL's community partners. Volunteering and gaining community experience often requires time and money, two resources that are in short supply for many university students. Funding from Cooperative Education and Work-Integrated Learning Canada (CEWIL Canada) and the federal government has enabled us to both attract and support students to undertake CSL in their academic program.

CSL has also received funding from the Business + Higher Education Roundtable (BHER) to support our environmental partners in co-educating our students in 'green foundations and skills'. Through BHER's 'Network to Net Zero' program, also funded by the federal government, students completed CSL projects with organizations such as Aquatic Biosphere, Society of High Prairie Regional Environmental Action Committee and South East Alberta Watershed Alliance (SEAWA).

A special thanks to CSL's Evaluation Coordinator, Katie Kincaid, for her extra work on these CEWIL and BHER grants. Katie moves on from CSL this summer to do some teaching in her PhD degree in Psychology. We thank her for three years of high-quality evaluation programming! Katie's surveys provide the data for our Annual Report.



The City of Edmonton invited the Humanities (HUM) program to support adult education in the North East of the city. Lisa Prins and the Humanities interns facilitated learning opportunities for people in the Dunluce housing community over the Winter term. CSL and the Humanities program continue to respond to community requests for adult education, whether in the Edmonton Institution for Women, Wings Shelter, or other communities.

A special thanks to our hard-working CSL student interns this past year -Ruby Lall and Valencia Das - who brought tremendous energy and creativity to their work. The 'Wellness with a Little CSL'ness' student mental health day with pet therapy was a highlight! Our Humanities interns - Bonita Bohnet and Nikita Roy Choudhury - continue their important work for us next year A sincere thank you to all who have contributed to the success of our program. In particular, I recognize our donors for their continued support, especially the Friends of the University of Alberta, the Muehlenfeld Family Foundation, the Edmonton Community Foundation, CEWIL Canada, BHER, and our scholarship and bursary endowments from Dr. Troy and Mrs. Karen Basarab and the late Lynn Morgan.



Students Evaluation Results

"I gained a new perspective on learning. I gained experience and adjusted my previous beliefs around inclusion." - CSL Student

At the end of each term, CSL conducts evaluation surveys. This year, we offered our full range of surveys to students, community partners, and our academic instructors. Participation rates remain relatively high for these kinds of surveys, and certainly can be said to be representative, in general terms, of how CSL is being experienced by these constituencies.

Students from equity deserving students see quite quickly that CSL can be a way for them to pursue higher education in a way where their knowledge and abilities can be in service of their communities. CSL both attracts and develops students who realize that the purpose of higher education is not only to gain a better income as an individual. It is to make our world more just and fair for all.

A student highlights how: "This was one of my favourite university courses in my university experience thus far. I gained a significant amount of knowledge about community service and how to better approach it due to some of the pitfalls in the current system. I would love to be involved in more work like this outside of the university...I believe the content... will stick with me for the rest of my life. It was very impactful."



Certificate in Community engagement and service-learning

The Certificate in Community Engagement and Service-Learning demonstrates that a student has significantly integrated community service-learning (CSL) into their postsecondary education and spent 100 hours working in and learning from community organizations.

The knowledge and experience gained through CSL are applicable to a wide range of careers, including those in nongovernmental organizations (NGOs), the volunteer sector, business and government, and academic institutions.





Certificate Stories

BA Linguistics student, Nayeon Kim, discovered her passion for speechlanguage pathology through one of her CSL placements

"In one of my early placements, I acted as a teaching assistant for a kindergarten teacher for a classroom of children with Autism Spectrum Disorder. Here, I was also introduced to the use of Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) devices. TCSL helped me find what I am really passionate about and solidified my career aspirations which was, and is, to become a speechlanguage pathologist. Since then I have successfully applied to the UofA's MScSLP program and begin this Fall." BA Criminology student, Emma Edney. began her journey at Youth Restorative Action Project (YRAP) through a 20 hour placement in CSL 100. 4 years later, she now sits on their Board of Directors.

"I am beyond grateful for CSL. It truly showed me that university doesn't always have to be about academics, it can be about what makes you happy in the community. Without CSL, I wouldn't have found my passion for youth criminal law." Emma will be the first recipient from the University of Alberta to pursue the BCL/JD avenue of the McCall MacBain Scholarship.

Non-Profit Board Internship Program (NPBI)

A joint project of the University of Alberta's Community Service-Learning (CSL) Program and the Career Centre, NPBI provides students the opportunity to learn the variety of practices and skills involved in serving on the boards of community-based non-profit organizations. It also meets the noncredit requirement for the Certificate in Community Engagement and Service-Learning.

The board placement, under the guidance of a volunteer mentor from the host board, affords students the opportunity to attend and participate in board meetings and other activities.

"The NPBI program has been an incredible opportunity for me to learn both profession-specific skills and soft skills such as leadership, communication, and collaboration. These skills are essential in any field and profession and have enabled me to push forward the issues and values that matter most to me - in my case, climate change and sustainability. NPBI has also connected me with exceptional mentors who have shared their experiences and insights with me. This guidance has been invaluable in shaping my perspective and approach to my work, and I feel grateful for the opportunity to learn from them."

CSL Equity Award

With support from the Co-operative Education and Work-Integrated Learning Canada (<u>CEWIL Canada</u>) and the Canadian federal government, from September 2023 - August 2024, CSL awarded 331 students with the CSL Equity Award for successful participation in an official CSL Course.

The \$1000 bursary helps students with time and money needed to participate in a CSL placement. In total, CSL has funded students with approximately \$340,000 to equity deserving students to participate in CSL.

Awards were available for students from the following equity deserving backgrounds or identities:

- Indigenous students
- racialized Canadians
- persons living with a disability
- female-identifying or nonbinary persons studying STEM
- newcomers to Canada (within 5 years)
- official language minorities
- LGBTQ2S+ students
- students living in remote or rural locations
- students with low socioeconomic status
- mature students, an
- students from refugee pathways

CSL has partnered with the Aquatic Biosphere Society for over 5 years, utilizing student perspectives and knowledge to help them achieve their goals. In Winter 2024, CMPUT 401 students assisted the Aquatic Biosphere in building a gaming application. These students had the opportunity to learn new programming languages and put their skills to use in creating a tangible product.

In February 2024, the Aquatic Biosphere Society launched a new travelling public exhibit, called 'The Minnow.' CSL students helped bring forward cutting-edge concepts to ensure The Minnow meets its objectives: to promote a sense of stewardship for our waterways, to build knowledge, and activate a wonder of all things.

In our Faces of CSL interview, Paula Polman, the chair of the Aquatic Biosphere Society observes that CSL students have helped dial down big projects into discrete ones, providing "self-control and hope" for the students and the organization, adding that "you will be surprised at what students can bring to the table."




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Humanities 101

Working alongside Jill Horbay, Manager, Museum Programs and Outreach, we were able to organize weekly field trips that had us tromping all across campus visiting collections and labs that house unique and engaging learning collections, including the Vascular Plant Herbarium, Print Study Centre, Mactaggart Art Collection, a Public Art Walk, E.H. Strickland Entomological Museum, The Dino Lab, Mineralogy & Petrology Museum, WG Hardy Classics Museum, and more! In addition to U of A Museum supported tours we enjoyed classes in the Map Library, Sperber Library, and Digital Scholarship Centre. We even went so far as to tour off campus and visit two incredible making spaces where we were able to create collective art together! Dunluce

On the other side of amiskwacîwâskahikan we spent the fall getting to know the Dunluce neighbourhood. In partnership with the City of Edmonton and Civida Housing, we introduced a new Humanities 101 course at a Civida Housing community space in the heart of Dunluce.

Together, with the support of Dr. Katie MacDonald, the Humanities 101 team successfully held a new Humanities 101 course: "Representations". This 11-week course invited several guests from both campus and the community to lead us in thinking about the many ways we makesense of our every-day.

This course was supported by several guest instructors. One guest, who has been an incredible supporter of HUM for over a decade is Dr. Beverly Lemire. Dr. Lemire introduced us to the many ways we can learn about a person and a community through the materials that are produced, specifically quilts. Inspired by Gee's Bend and others, we each made our own quilts and shared them, along with other art we made through the term, at a final graduation art show!



The Learning Club

Far away in another direction we continued to provide learning and sharing opportunities for people living inside Edmonton Institution for Women, a federal penitentiary. In collaboration with University of Alberta Library, we coordinated and organized The Learning Club which delivered 16 different learning packages that were facilitated within EIFW every second week over both the fall and winter terms.

These learning packages were filled with Indigenous art, writing, and thinking, as well as activities that support an overall theme. The two themes from the past year were "Indigenous Peoples Around the World" and "Indigenous Creatives."
