# **English Major Worksheet**

Students wishing to major in English must take  $\bigstar 6$  of junior English (or  $\bigstar 3$  of junior ENGL plus WRS 101) and a minimum of  $\bigstar 30$  to a maximum of  $\bigstar 48$  at the 200-level or above, including  $\bigstar 9$  at the 200-level\*,  $\bigstar 9$  at the 300-level and  $\bigstar 6$  at the 400-level.

- 2. \* Effective September 2019: Students who entered the program before September 2019 will be allowed to graduate with  $\bigstar 6$  credits. All students entering the program after September 2019 will need  $\bigstar 9$  at the 200-level.
