Meet the Team




Sara Dorow (Director)

I am Professor of Sociology (Faculty of Arts) at the U of A, where I have previously served as Chair of the Department of Sociology, Founding Director of the Community Service-Learning Program, and Associate Director of the Intersections of Gender signature area. My research seems to have unfolded in phases: a multi-sited ethnographic study of transnational adoption; then multi-method research in the northern Alberta oil sands region; and now two projects involving community-based research on housing and a multi-media exploration of work, respectively. I enjoy teaching qualitative methods at both the undergraduate and graduate levels.

Gillian Lemermeyer (Associate Director)

I am an Assistant Professor in the Faculty of Nursing at the U of A. The questions I explore in my research are situated in the relational encounters between nurses and other healthcare practitioners with the people in their care. I focus on themes of embodied ethics, the nurse's touch, and the ethics of artificial intelligence in healthcare. My teaching practice is in healthcare ethics and qualitative research methods.

Events and Activities



For over 20 years, Thinking Qualitatively (TQ) has offered a rich learning environment for people seeking to build their knowledge and skills in qualitative methods and methodologies.

The iiQM is now trying something new - offering TQ as a mostly virtual event, while still featuring webinars, workshops, and keynotes. The virtual environment makes more TQ affordable and accessible for graduate students, early career scholars, and community practitioners from around the world. We are also taking a thematic approach to provide a touchstone for each year's offerings.

June 2023, we offered TQ:DI - Thinking Qualitatively: Doing Intersectionality. One-hundred and thirty participants from a dozen countries learned from and with 20 presenters, with graduate assistants Heather Gray Lamm and Olesya Kochkina offering expert coordination and support. Feedback was heartening. More than three-quarters of the participants who provided feedback declared TQ:DI "very good" or "excellent," with comments such as:

"Great conference. I learned a ton of stuff."

"Wonderful diversity of presenters from multiple contexts."

Online Learning Modules

As part of TQ:DI, iiQM received funding to create free, online learning modules. Two fantastic research assistants, Heather Gray Lamm (Education) and Samadrita Chowdhuri (Sociology), have finished the first draft of two self-directed online courses:

- Introduction to Intersectional Qualitative Research
- Intersectionality in Qualitative Health Research

We will soon embark on the pilot testing phase of this work, and hope to have the modules up on the U of A public learning site (eClass) by March 2024. Thanks to Mandy George at the Center for Teaching and Learning for guidance and support in this endeavour. The University is lucky to have many dedicated qualitative methods instructors across campus and the iiQM is committed to building this community through networking and knowledge-sharing opportunities. We first met in March of 2023, and then gathered again on December 8 for a hybrid panel discussion and conversation. Doctors Bonnie Stelmach (Education), Marghalara Rashid (Medicine and Dentistry), and Ken Caine (Sociology) got us thinking and talking about the tensions in trying to both teach and critically analyze the "basics" of methods qualitative and methodologies.



Research and Collaboration

Decolonizing Approaches to Research at uAlberta (DARA)

In 2022, with funding support from the Situated Knowledges and Indigenous Peoples and Place signature area and the Kule Institute for Advanced Study, iiQM brought together an interdisciplinary team of scholars to find out how researchers across the University of Alberta understand and practice "decolonization" in their research.

Some forty faculty from diverse disciplines shared their stories and perspectives in a survey, one-on-one conversations, and a Kitchen Table conversation. The final report will be available by spring 2024.

This work is part of iiQM's commitment to practicing good relations and

helping to ask good questions about some of the Eurocentric assumptions of qualitative research.
