Thinking Qualitatively: Time and Place (June 3-5, 2024) was one of our most ambitious and most well-received events. Over 3 days, we welcomed a record number of over 130 registrants from 19 countries and 68 institutions as we considered a theme of time and place in over 23 interactive sessions. Our free public <u>keynote series</u> also drew hundreds of attendees across disciplines.

**Remembering Sarah Stahlke** (April 5, 1962 – August 7, 2024)

We pause to remember the life of **Dr. Sarah Jeanne Stahlke**, who passed away in early August in Edmonton, Alberta. Over the years, Sarah served in several roles with iiQM, including Education Director, Advisory Board member, and convener of Thinking Qualitatively. She was a prolific and passionate qualitative methodologist who especially contributed to advancing



the field of autoethnography.

Sarah was a lifelong learner who loved to mentor and support others in their development.
