Course Description and Objectives:

This course is a practical workshop in the translation from Spanish into English. We will address concepts from translation theory and practice, as well as a variety of textual genres, and grammatical and lexical difficulties. The main emphasis will be on the production (and assessment) of target texts (TT) from appropriate source texts (ST). The course will be conducted in both English and Spanish. Students are expected to participate actively in class meetings when we will discuss the assignments and readings. Assignments and readings will be based on the required textbook (see below), other readings will be available online or on reserve, and other assignments be distributed through eClass as specified on the supplementary class schedule. The course will include a mandatory Community Service Learning component that will allow students to take what they learn in the classroom into the community. Students will receive academic credit for assignments connected with their Community Service Learning work. Details regarding this component of the course will be discussed in class throughout the semester.
