# Course Description and Objectives:

CLIT 230 A1: Scandalous Fictions:

The course examines the "scandalous" fictions of early modern novels from James Joyce's *Ulysses* to Oscar Wilde's *A portrait of Dorian Grey*, from Kleist's *The Marquise von O* to Mark Twain's *Huckleberry Finn*. The course will also discuss the movie versions of these novels to examine how the notion of "scandal" varies from novels to their translation into movies. By the end of the course students will have gained a better understanding of what constitutes a "scandalous novel" and how notions of "scandalous" and "scandal" vary not only in time but from the novel translation into movie.

#### **Texts:**

Novels discussed in class will be available on One-day Library Reserve. Grade Distribution (see "Explanatory Notes"):

Class participation: 20%; In-Class Presentation (Dates TBD in class): 20%; Paper 1, due Oct. 12, 20%; Paper 2, due Nov. 14, 20%; Paper 3, due Dec. 12, 20%. All papers should be no longer but no less than 10 pages, double spaced and well-written. There is no midterm or final exam.
