Course Description and Objectives:

An in-depth and comprehensive approach to the most crucial literary and cultural philosophies/theories from classical times to the Frankfurt School. Emphasis will be put on the imbrication of thinkers and texts with key moments in history. Bridges with contemporary questions and problems will be regularly suggested and explored. An international, transcultural perspective will be favored. Students will read primary texts.

Divided into 4 modules, this course will pursue the following topics :

- 1) *Mimesis and Representation*
- 2) *The Rise of the Self and Self-Expressivity*
- 3) *The Dissolution of the Self and Modernity*
- 4) *The Rise of Critical Theory*
