Course Description, Objectives and Expected Learning Outcomes:

Thesis Timetable

During the proposal stage, the student will:

- Meet regularly (weekly) with me, as a thesis supervisor, to report on the work completed and/or to discuss problems encountered.
- Develop a thesis proposal which will include:
- 1. Statement of the research problem
- 2. Literature review
- 3. Theoretical framework
- 4. Description of the methodology
- 5. Plan for analysis
- 6. Give an oral presentation defending the thesis proposal.

The proposal and oral defense must be completed and approved by me, as a thesis supervisor, by December 15th of 2020.

Please be aware that if work is deemed unacceptable and/or the student fails to meet the established deadlines, the student will be required to withdraw from the course.

The student will carry out the research, analyze the results, write and defend the thesis during the winter semester. The findings which will arise from the analysis, discussion of the findings, and a discussion of implications for practice will be added to the proposal document to constitute a complete thesis.

A typical thesis will include:

- Abstract
- Introduction
- Literature review
- Problem statement/research goals and objectives
- Theoretical framework
- Methods and/or research design
- Results
- Conclusion
