Course Description and Objectives:

This course will introduce students to literature in cyber space. It will survey relevant theories and examples in order to familiarize students with initiation and evolutions of electronic literature. Students will develop familiarity and critical and comparative thinking skills to study various genres of cyber literature including hyper text, interactive fiction, digital poetry, blogging, etc. By the end of the term, students are expected to demonstrate ability to identify these genres, read electronic literature critically, and compare and contrast examples of cyber literature.

Explanatory Notes on Assignments:

Detailed description of assignments will posted as on eClass.

Active Participation includes regular class attendance and participation in group and class-wide discussions.

Class presentation involves reporting on scholarly materials on a course topic students choose (scheduled throughout the term).

Midterm exam aims to assess students’ understanding of course materials.

Term paper project presentation is designed so that students can share their term paper projects in class and receive feedback from peers and the instructor before submitting the material.

Term paper (4-5 pages in length) involves writing critically and/or comparatively on select course materials.

Final exam is designed to assess students’ understating of the course offerings.

In this course, regular attendance is mandatory. Students only have one absence allowance throughout the semester. Any more absences from the class will lead to partial or total loss of the participation segment of the course grade (15%), unless the student has a valid excuse for his/her absence (e.g., health problems, serious emergency case, serious domestic issues). Planning conflicts or being too busy with assignments of other courses DO NOT count as valid excuse for absence.

Policy for Late Assignments:

Students who consult **in advance** with the instructor regarding contingencies preventing the timely completion of an assignment may, at the discretion of the instructor, be granted an extension just one time throughout the course with no penalty. **No second extension** will be granted to a student. The penalty for late submission of assignments is 5% per day. Example: An essay that is worthy of grade “A” (~92%) will be graded “A-” (~87%) if submitted one day late, and “B+” if submitted two days late. Late excuses will **not** be accepted for any reason.

Grading:

Marks for assignments, tests, and exams are given in percentages, to which letter grades are also assigned, according to the table below (“**MLCS Undergraduate Grading Scale**”). The percentage mark resulting from the entire term work and examination then produces the final letter grade for the course.
