## **Course Description and Objectives:**

Instructor: Micah True, PhD

The objective of this course is to help students hone their writing skills in French. Students will read and write expository, critical, and creative texts, and will study general rules for the gender of French nouns that will help them eliminate errors from their written French. At the end of this course, successful students will be able to write in mostly error-free French, formulate coherent arguments in written form, and express their ideas in clear and succinct language.

#### **Explanatory Notes on Assignments:**

**Participation and attendance:** You are expected to attend and actively participate in class. This includes:

- 1. Thoroughly preparing all work assigned for each class session
- 2. Contributing actively to class discussion and activities. This includes not only regularly sharing your own thoughts about what we read, but also listening attentively and responding to your classmates' ideas.

**Important note:** Disruptive behaviour in class is a sign of disrespect both to the instructor and to your fellow students, and will not be tolerated. Activities such as chatting, using or frequently checking your phone, studying for another class, etc. will result in a low participation grade. **Cell phones should be turned OFF during class, and should remain put away.** 

**Quizzes:** Most weeks, students will take a short quiz on Fridays on grammatical rules that will be presented on Mondays. These quizzes will be cumulative.

**In-class writing:** Every Friday, students will work in small groups on a writing exercise. These written assignments will be produced individually, and then edited and improved in small groups.

**Papers:** Students will write three short papers of approximately 3-4 pages each over the course of the semester. Each paper will reflect a different style of writing studied in class: exposition, persuasion, and creative writing. Topics and detailed instructions will be provided by the professor ahead of time.

### Policy for Late Assignments:

All work is due **in class** on the day for which it is assigned. After class, work will be accepted with a 5% penalty, with an additional 5%-per-day penalty assessed for each subsequent day of lateness. Students who consult **in advance** with the professor regarding contingencies preventing the timely completion of an assignment may, **at the discretion of the instructor**, be granted an extension.
