Course Description and Objectives:

The purpose of this course is to provide an introduction to the main features of standard French phonetics, through contrastive analysis of rhythm, vowels and consonants in French and English. At the end of the course, students will have improved their pronunciation as well as their theoretical knowledge of the pronunciation of standard French.
