Course Description and Objectives:

The course is designed to further develop communication skills in Italian (listening, speaking, reading, writing, and cultural literacy) at intermediate level. You will be exposed to Italian social and cultural aspects through stories, film and other material. Emphasis throughout the course will be on class activities, reading of a semi-authentic texts, discussion of texts, videos and other material. By the end of the course, you will be able to comprehend and engage in conversations on everyday topics, read and understand semi-authentic and some authentic texts and improve your writing skills. You will be able to communicate more effectively in both oral and written Italian at the intermediate level.

Explanatory Notes on Assignments:

1. Attendance and Participation: Regular attendance is essential for optimal performance in a foreign-language course. Instructor keeps record of all missed classes. In cases of potentially excusable absences due to illness, domestic affliction, religious convictions or university-related business notify your instructor by e-mail within two days. Regarding absences that may be excusable and procedures for addressing course components missed as a result, consult sections 23.4.2 and 23.4.3 of the University Calendar. Be aware that unexcused

absences will be reflected in your grade for the "attendance and participation" component(s) of the course, as well as for any assignments that are not handed-in or completed as a result (see below).

Participation is based on the ability of the student to collaborate with the instructor and classmates on a daily basis in order to facilitate the learning process, and to actively participate in classroom activities. Participation also includes satisfactory completion of all assignments, besides the ones in *Immagina*.

- 2. Tests: Tests are designed to assess students' skills and will be based on the material covered in class. Students will take two in-class tests, each one worth 10%. Please note that unexcused absences will result in a grade of ZERO.
- 3. In-Class Composition: In order to perfect their writing skills students will complete an in-class composition. Students will write a composition on topics related to the rubrics in *Immagina* as well as the various readings. The composition will be completed in 2 stages, a first draft that will receive feedback from the instructor so that students can then prepare their second draft.
- **4.** *Oral presentation:* Students are responsible for a 15 minutes oral presentation either alone or in groups (no more than 2 per group). The topic and format of the presentation should be agreed upon with instructor in advance. Students should deliver their presentation orally and in person. Use of index cards, visual and audio support should be very limited and will be discussed in advance with instructor.
- **5. Dossier:** Students will keep a dossier where matters related to the class, reflections about specific topics, etc. with entries of about 200 wds per week. To be consigned second last week of classes.
- 6. Final Oral Exam: During the last week of class, at a time to be agreed with instructor, students will take a circa 10-minutes oral exam individually.
- **7. Final Written Exam:** Students will take a cumulative in-class 3-hour final exam on the day indicated in the schedule. Please note that dates of final exams are very strictly followed. In case of unexcused absence from Final Exam students receive a grade of ZERO.
