Explanatory Notes on Assignments:

Quiz Grades: A quiz gets 2/2 if 80% or more of the inflectional forms and vocabulary items are correct, 1/2 if 70-79% are correct, 0/2 is 0-69% are correct, rounded to the nearest whole number.

Reading Grades: You get a 2/2 for a reading grade if you translate every part of a text that you are asked to and can identify the inflectional form of the words therein that you would be reasonably expected to know (you get the benefit of the doubt on reasonable efforts). You get a 1/2 if you take a pass on any given section that you are asked to translate, or if you cannot identify the inflectional form of words therein that you would be reasonably expected to know. You get a 0/2 if you pass on translating more than once in a given day, or if you pass once plus cannot identify the inflectional forms you are asked to.

<u>Test Grades (including the final)</u>: You are graded directly in proportion to the number of inflectional forms and translations you get entirely correct (where applicable, such as in a reading section, misidentification of a word's inflectional form and mistranslation of it count as two separate errors). I.e. if you get 75% of the inflectional forms and translated words entirely correct on a test worth 18 points, then you get 14 points.
