#### **Course Description and Objectives:**

The goal of this course is to introduce students to a variety of topics related to teaching Spanish as a second/foreign language. The topics will cover issues regarding teaching methods, lesson planning, developing materials and activities, teaching the four skills (speaking, listening, reading and writing) as well as different language aspects (vocabulary, grammar), and assessment. While the course establishes connections with theoretical aspects of language acquisition, the main focus is on actual practices in instructional settings.

By the end of the course, successful students will be able to:

- identify and discuss principles of communicative and task-based language teaching
- identify and describe aspects of major teaching methods
- design activities, lessons, and units for language teaching
- critically analyze teaching practices
- evaluate and critique teaching materials and activities

## **Explanatory Notes on Assignments:**

## Participation 5%

Regular attendance and active participation in class discussions and activities is an assumed pre-requisite for completing the course satisfactorily. Since class discussions focus on the assigned readings, you should prepare them carefully at home, engage in the material in a thoughtful and informed manner, and contribute to a productive class discussion.

## Reflective paper 10%

You will have to complete a questionnaire about language learning and write a short essay (4-5 pages, double-spaced) justifying your responses to five of the questionnaire items. The due date is January 29. Further details will be discussed in class.

## Test preparation 5%

To prepare for the tests, we will discuss in class what they should look like. You will be asked to submit questions and ideas for the tests. I will then compile all possible test items and return them to you in the form of a worksheet so that you can prepare for the tests. This is your chance to actively participate in the creation of the tests.

## **Tests** 30%

There will two tests, each worth 15%, focusing on the topics we will discuss in class. The tests might consist of definitions, short answers and essay questions. Test I is scheduled for February 8 and Test II is scheduled for April 8.

#### Observation report 5%

You will visit a Spanish language class (100- or 200-level) and write an observation report (2 pages, double-spaced). I will help you make arrangements with an instructor. The classroom visit will give you the opportunity to observe a class "from the other side" and observe how the instructor structures the lesson, uses the target language, etc. The date of the observation and the deadline for submitting the report will depend on the topic you choose. At the beginning of the term, you will choose a topic and you will be given a specific timeframe to complete your observation and hand in your report. We will discuss the details in class.

#### Classroom activity 10%

You will design and present an activity (not an entire lesson plan) that you have devised yourself (i.e., not presented

in a textbook). At the beginning of the term, you will sign up for one of the following categories of classroom activities: listening comprehension (Feb. 22), reading comprehension (Feb. 29), oral communication (Mar. 7), writing (Mar. 14), grammar (Mar. 21), and vocabulary (Mar. 30). The written paper of the activity is due one week after the presentation. The activities will serve as further examples for the chapter we read on these particular topics, so you should make sure to read the chapter before you design your activity.

#### Project outline 5%

The main project of this course is the design of a teaching unit. Before you start working on the specific activities of this unit, you have to submit an outline, worth 5%, discussing the topic, intended level of the learners, objectives, learning outcomes, expected end product, and rationale for the unit. The project outline is due on February 26.

## Final project 30%

For the final project, you will have to design a teaching unit about a specific topic that will encompass five lessons and include at least one activity from each of the categories listed above (i.e., listening, reading, grammar...). The final project is due on April 12. Further details and guidelines will be discussed in class.

## **Grading:**

Marks for assignments, tests, and exams are given in percentages, to which letter grades are also assigned, according to the table below ("MLCS Undergraduate Grading Scale"). The percentage mark resulting from the entire term work and examination then produces the final letter grade for the course.

a. Please note:

- For an absence to be considered excused, instructors will request adequate documentation to substantiate the reason for the absence (i.e. in the form of a "Medical Declaration Form for Students" <a href="https://uofa.ualberta.ca/arts/-/media/arts/student-services/documents/medicaldeclarationformforstudents.pdf">https://uofa.ualberta.ca/arts/-/media/arts/student-services/documents/medicaldeclarationformforstudents.pdf</a>). Please, note that a "Statutory Declaration" submitted at the end of term covering multiple absences during the term will not be accepted.

- A student must inform the instructor within two working days following the class which was missed, or as soon as the student is able, having regard to the circumstances underlying the absence.
- For missed exams or term work, no extension will be given after this deadline has elapsed and a grade of ZERO will be assigned.
- For an excused absence where the cause is religious belief, a student must contact the instructor(s) within two weeks of the start of Fall or Winter classes; and within three days of the start of Spring or Summer classes.
- No request for make-up for missed work or exams will be considered without proper documentation.
- Providing any kind of document(s) does not imply an automatic approval; it will be at the discretion of the instructor to accept or decline a document and/or grant the student's request for an excused absence.

<u>b. Unexcused absences.</u> Each student is allowed <u>four unexcused</u> absences for the entire term. This does not include days on which assignments are due or when an exam or test is given. In addition, a grade of ZERO will be given for any exams or assignments that are not handed in or completed as a result of an unexcused absence.

- Students should be aware that under <u>no circumstances</u> will homework assignments, quizzes, compositions, and/or written and/or oral exams/presentations be made up unless special arrangements have been made with the instructor prior to the due date or the exam date.
