## **Course Prerequisite:**

SPAN 320 and an additional \*3 in SPAN at the 300-level excluding 300 or 306, or consent of Department

## **Course Description and Objectives:**

Although there are many places where Spanish is used, it is rare for Spanish to be the sole language spoken there. In this course, we will examine what happens when Spanish coexists with other languages, either as the dominant language, as in Spain and Latin America, or as a minority language, as in the United States and Canada. We will learn about both the linguistic and the social effects of language contact. We will also conduct a survey on language ideologies among Hispanics in Canada.

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- explain how languages in contact can influence each other linguistically and provide examples
- identify social factors that influence language use in contact situations
- compare the sociolinguistic outcomes of different contact situations
- design, conduct and analyze a basic survey

## **Explanatory Notes on Assignments and Tests:**

<u>Tests</u>: The tests will be based on the textbook, any related assigned readings, and class discussions, covering the specified chapters only. The tests must be taken on the scheduled date. In cases of potentially excusable absences, a make-up test will be administered at the earliest mutually convenient time and date. If the student fails to show for the make-up test, a grade of zero will be recorded. For an unexcusable absence, a mark of zero will be recorded. There is no final exam in the course.

<u>Survey project</u>: Students will design a survey examining the language ideologies of Hispanics in Canada. Each student will be responsible for recruiting at least one participant to complete the survey online. Students will then work in groups to analyze the results and prepare a PowerPoint presentation with their analysis. Further instructions will be provided in class and posted on eClass.

<u>Presentation</u>: A list of articles will be provided by the instructor. You will be asked, in pairs, to select one of the articles for a "pecha kucha" style presentation. Further instructions will be provided in class and posted on eClass.

# **Grading**:

Marks for assignments, tests, and exams are given in percentages. Letter grades will be assigned only to the final distribution of mark totals for the course. "Grades reflect judgements of student achievement made by instructors and must correspond to the associated descriptor. These judgements are based on a combination of absolute achievement and relative performance in a class."
