Course Description and Objectives:

Examination of theoretical, sociological and historical aspects pertaining to the contemporary Québécois novel, short story, and film against the backdrop of urban/suburban/rural contexts and the cultural tensions therein. The course will be given entirely in French. At the end of this course, students will have acquired a basic knowledge of representative works pertaining to francophone Quebec culture and literature in the genres of poetry and novel; they will also have acquired advanced skills in oral debating in French, as well as consolidated their previous knowledge of the language, both oral and written.

Explanatory Notes on Assignments:

The discussion tables will be performed in teams, and will focus on the assigned readings. The two written assignments (each 1000 words approx.) will focus on visual media approaches. The team orals will focus on outlining a practical/creative application of the theory and discussions throughout the semester.
