Course Description and Objectives:

This course will familiarize students with basic linguistic differences and principles of translation between English and French. Through the acquisition of theoretical concepts, notions of contrastive linguistics, analysis and regular translation exercises, students will learn to transfer texts from French into English and from English into French. They will be expected to work individually, in pairs and in groups. Some assignments will be related to the Internet. The course will be taught in French.

By the end of the course students will know how to translate short texts from French into English and vice versa and will have the skills to recognize difficulties due to the differences between those two languages as well as be familiar with various strategies to deal with them.

Explanatory Notes on Assignments:

Short assignments will be required every two weeks as posted on e-class. The tests will be announced the previous week. Both the midterm and the final exams will consist in a text to translate, based on what has been learned up to the date of the exam.
