Course Description and Objectives:

Second Year Russian meets three hours per week; an additional hour per week will be scheduled in consultation with the class. The goals of this course are: to review basic Russian grammar; to broaden this foundation with the addition of intermediate grammar and syntax; to increase vocabulary; to develop speaking, understanding, reading and writing skills. Attention will be paid to listening and comprehension skills, using with materials from Russian news clips, songs and films where possible. As students develop their fluency and vocabulary, they will gain deeper insight into Russian culture, discussing topics such as history, music, cinema, art, current affairs, and television in Russian. By the end of the course successful students should thus be able to engage in a conversation and write basic essays on intellectual topics.

Explanatory notes
