Course Description and Objectives:	

The course is designed to further develop communication skills in Italian (listening, speaking, reading, writing, and cultural literacy) at intermediate level. You will be exposed to Italian social and cultural aspects through stories, film and other material. Emphasis throughout the course will be on class activities, reading of semi-authentic texts, discussion of texts, videos and other material. By the end of the course, you will be able to comprehend and engage in conversations on everyday topics, read and understand semi-authentic and some authentic texts and improve your writing skills. You will be able to communicate more effectively in oral Italian and to write short compositions at the intermediate level.

- 1. Attendance and Participation: Regular punctual attendance is essential for optimal performance in a foreign-language course. Instructor keeps record of all missed classes. In cases of potentially excusable absences due to illness, domestic affliction, religious convictions or university-related business notify your instructor by e-mail within two days. Regarding absences that may be excusable and procedures for addressing course components missed as a result, consult sections <a href="Attendance">Attendance</a> and <a href="Examinations">Examinations</a> of the University Calendar. Be aware that unexcused absences will be reflected in your grade for the "attendance and participation" component(s) of the course, as well as for any assignments that are not handed-in or completed as a result (see below). Participation is based on the ability of the student to collaborate with the instructor and classmates in class in order to facilitate the learning process, and to actively participate in classroom activities. Participation also includes coming to class prepared.
- **2.** *Homework:* Students will be asked to hand in assignments, either from the textbook or from other material provided by the instructor, and on the textbook's Supersite. Students are responsible for completing and handing in these assignments on time.
- 3. Tests: Tests are designed to assess students' skills and will be based on the material covered in class. Students will take three in-class tests, each one worth 10%. Please note that unexcused absences will result in a grade of ZERO.
- **4. Dossier:** during the course of the term, in order to perfect their writing skills, students will complete a dossier of short compositions (circa 150 wds. each) based on the chapters of the *Reader Don Camillo* posted on E-class. The compositions will be completed in 2 stages; the first draft will receive feedback from the instructor, so that students can then prepare the second draft for the final dossier to be handed in during the last week of classes.
- 5. Oral presentation: Students are responsible for a 10 minutes oral presentation either alone or in pairs. The topic and format of the presentation should be agreed upon with instructor in advance and will be posted on E-class. Students should deliver their presentation orally and in person. Use of index cards, visual and audio support should be very limited and will be discussed in advance with instructor.
- 6. Final Oral Exam: During the last week of class, at a time to be agreed with instructor, students will take a circa 10-minutes oral exam individually.
