# **Course Description, Objectives and Expected Learning Outcomes:**

The course is designed as a survey of representative print adaptations of traditional oral folk tales as well as the genre of literary fairy tale. Students will be introduced to the history and development of folk and fairy tales and will examine a wide range of representative texts from a variety of historical periods and traditions (Late Antiquity; Middle Ages; Renaissance; Romanticism; contemporary feminist and postmodern revisionist adaptations). Students will explore a number of critical approaches to folk tales and fairy tales (structuralism, psychoanalysis, gender studies, cultural studies, pedagogy). Analysis of literary texts will be complemented by film screenings and examples from other media. By the end of this course successful students will be able to identify representative characteristics of oral folk tales; recognize the diverse audiences and ideological functions of literary fairy tales during different historical periods; and present an analysis of the text(s) of their choice in a specific socio-historical context.

**Course Format:** The objectives of this course will be learned from a combination of formal lectures, assigned readings, class discussions on Zoom, and audiovisual materials.

# **Explanatory Notes on Assignments:**

Critical Response Paper: Each of the two papers is expected to show your critical engagement with the text in question (literary, visual, or critical). Because this is a short assignment, the paper is expected to offer a narrowly focused critical discussion/analysis of a specific aspect of the text of your choice from the class reading list.

*Midterm Examination* will be a series of short focused answers based on the texts covered in class. This open-book examination assignment will provide a selection of questions to choose from.

*Participation* mark includes your regular attendance of classes on Zoom, preparedness with readings, and informed participation in class discussions.

Forum posts include scheduled contributions to eClass forums (every 2-3 classes) where you are expected to provide a thoughtful and critical response of 300-350 words to the text(s) of your choice.

*Final Assignment* will be an open-book exercise similar to Midterm Examination. You will be expected to provide a series of extended focused answers based on the texts covered in class. The assignment will provide a selection of questions to choose from.
