Course Description and Objectives.	

Course Description and Objectives:

Instructor: Dr. Patrizia Bettella

Italian 112 is intended for students who have already completed Italian 111 or equivalent. The course is an introduction to the Italian language and Italian-speaking culture. Students further develop basic communication skills in Italian (listening, speaking, reading, writing, and cultural literacy). At the end of

the course, students will be able to comprehend and engage in simple conversations on everyday topics, read and understand short texts and write letters and other short texts.

Not to be taken by:

- Native or near native speakers
- Students with credit in ITAL 100, or with **Italian 30** or its equivalent in Canada and other countries.

Objectives: with this course students will:

- Continue in the development of basic communicative skills
- Learn to understand others and express themselves in spoken and written Italian. Expand on writing skills using connected discourse
- Use Italian to communicate in a wide range of contexts, and to present orally
- Acquire grammatical structures and vocabulary
- Develop cultural competency on the Italian context.

Course Format: Blended Learning

Method of Language Acquisition:

ITAL 112 continues the new model for the beginners' Italian language class, introduced in Fall 2020. The course meets three hours per week Face-to-Face (F2F): Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. The online sessions on Tuesdays and Thursdays (Self-Study) are completed by students independently. Timely completion of the Self-Study activities is essential for succeeding in this course. Self-Study activities are not optional, they are worth 10% of your Participation Grade.

Explanatory Notes on Assignments:

PARTICIPATION, PREPARATION: You are expected to attend Face to Face (F2F) Zoom classes regularly and punctually. On Tuesdays and Thursdays you will complete the Self-Study activities listed on E-class. The completion of the Self-Study activities is mandatory and is part of your grade for participation and preparation. In-class participation includes evidence of individual preparation and attention, and contribution to individual and in group work. In case of potentially excusable absences notify your instructor by e-mail as soon as possible, or within 1 day. Self-Study includes the activities listed on E-class and assigned online. All Self-Study activities must be completed before the next F2F lesson. You cannot learn and make good use of class time without daily preparation. Please follow deadlines.

MINI-QUIZZES: mini-quizzes will be assigned on Fridays to assess what was learned during the week. WRITTEN TASKS: In order to improve writing skills students will complete some writing tasks of 100 to 150 words each. Students will upload their work on E-Class.

UNIT TESTS: There will be three unit-tests based on material from each Chapter; they are intended to assess various skills practiced during the course. Tests cannot be made up if absence is unexcused. Please note the unexcused absences result in a grade of ZERO.

ORAL PRESENTATION: Is designed to prepare student for the final oral exam, to assess oral performance and communicative competence. It will be done in pairs or individually for the duration of about 5 minutes each. More information about the format and delivery of the presentation will be available on E-Class.

FINAL ORAL EXAM: Is designed to assess oral performance, communicative competence. It will be done in pairs or individually. See details on E-Class

FINAL WRITTEN EXAM (DURATION 2 HOURS): this cumulative exam is based on the units and on all

other material covered during the winter term. Please note that dates of final exams are very strictly followed. In case of unexcused absence from Final exams students receive a grade of ZERO.
