Undergraduate Research Initiative

Many of us automatically associate research with science, engineering, and health; we think about lab coats and test tubes. Research is a process that involves asking questions and using the methods of our discipline to advance our knowledge and understanding of the subject. Although the methods used may differ among disciplines, research can be conducted in any field – natural sciences, social sciences, health sciences, humanities, and fine arts.

Many students assume that they're only doing undergraduate research if they're involved in a mentored research project or independent study. However, there are many ways to develop research skills, and if you're a student, chances are you've already taken your first steps!

Launched in September 2011, the Undergraduate Research Initiative (URI) reflects the University of Alberta's institutional goals for an engaged student community centered on inquiry, discovery and innovation.

The URI was launched to fill a key interdisciplinary brokering role, helping undergraduate students learn why and how to get involved in research activities. As a broad, central initiative, the URI integrates with existing experiential learning and engagement initiatives across campus without duplicating activities offered at Faculty and Department levels.

The URI has five main functions:

- To raise undergraduate students' awareness of and interest in research.
- To support undergraduate students in developing the knowledge and skills needed for participation in research.
- To facilitate opportunities for undergraduate students to engage in research.
- To assist undergraduate students in disseminating and celebrating research results and achievements.
- To create and sustain a culture of undergraduate research at the University of Alberta.

An Advisory Committee and Academic Director, Dr. Connie Varnhagen, provide counsel, advice and direction in the planning and implementation of the URI. The day-to-day activities of the URI are supported by staff from CAPS: Your U of A Career Centre.

Kim Fordham Misfeldt 3M National Teaching Fellowship



Kim Fordham Misfeldt is a German language and literature professor, Chair of the Department of Humanties and Director of the Canadian Summer School in Germany from the University of Alberta's Augustana Campus.

No stranger to teaching awards, she won the Augustana Distinguished Teaching Award (2000) and the Rutherford Award for Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching (2011).

Kim teaches a variety of language, translation and literature courses at the junior and senior levels and also teaches a spring course in Germany. Her classes are models of active and collaborative learning and her classrooms have a dynamic of endeavour and support that brings out the very best in her students. She has developed into an internationally renowned teacher.

Through the Augustana campus's Human Library, she has used her personal experiences as a survivor of childhood sexual abuse to give voice to students and others in the community who need to tell their stories. She also volunteers at women's shelters, and gives presentations to people of both sexes about sexual violence in the community.

As director of the Canadian Summer School in Germany, Kim takes 60 students from across Canada and immerses them in the German culture.

Motivated by her desire to provide as many students as possible with a life-changing educational experience, Kim provides international educational leadership in her work. Her teaching empowers her students, gives them a love of learning, and allows them the freedom to find a path to knowledge as unique as they are as individuals.

Heather Zwicker 3M National Teaching Fellowship



Heather Zwicker, a professor in the Department of English and Film Studies and vice-dean in the Faculty of Arts. Her teaching is characterized by ongoing invention, experimentation, and adventure, bringing the excitement of intellectual inquiry to all levels of the undergraduate program.

Dr. Zwicker has excelled at undergraduate teaching and has won every undergraduate teaching award that she is eligible for at the University of Alberta including the Faculty of Arts Teaching Award (1999), Rutherford Award for Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching (1999), Teaching Matters! Award for Student Engagement (2008) and the Vargo Teaching Chair (2013).

Heather has taught at all levels of the curriculum, including introductory first-year courses, second-year critical concepts and survey courses offered to majors, as well as senior undergraduate and fourth-year seminars. She teaches a number of cultural studies courses on the city of Edmonton, instructing students about how to read Edmonton through theoretical texts, local literature, cartography, personal experience and history.

She is the first of two faculty members to earn promotion to Full Professor on the basis of teaching excellence in the Faculty of Arts. She believes in educating for active citizenship and cares deeply about the world of ideas and how these ideas affect the lives of people. Put simply, her goal is to make the world a better place, one course at a time!

Megan Engel Rhodes Scholarship



The Rhodes Scholarships were established in 1903 in the will of Cecil Rhodes and are considered among the most prestigious postgraduate scholarships in the world. They support students who demonstrate a strong propensity to emerge as 'leaders for the world's future.'

Megan Engel, a Bachelor of Science with First Class Honors, astrophysics graduate from the University of Alberta and now a Master of Science student in Physics, is a 2013 recipient of the Rhodes Scholarship. Surprisingly, Megan set this goal for herself when she was just 15. J.R.R. Tolkien is her hero and she has been profoundly influenced by his writing. When she found out he studied and taught at Oxford, she wanted to follow in his footsteps.

She is currently undertaking her Master's degree under the cosupervision of assistant professors Kevin Beach (theoretical condensed matter physics) and Michael Woodside (biophysics). She has always been fascinated by the solutions to human problems she sees hidden in the natural world: "We struggle to find sustainable energy, yet nature solved this crisis billions of years ago. A deep faith in God motivated the awe of nature that fuels my commitment to exploring the universe with sophisticated theoretical machinery."

She credits her success to the holistic education she has received, the incredible facilities at the University of Alberta and the National Institute of Nanotechnology, and her professors and advisors who have guided and inspired her to achieve her longcherished dream. Her next big goal is to one day earn a faculty position at the University of Alberta so that she can continue her research, volunteering and outreach, through programs such as Women in Scholarship, Engineering, Science and Technology (WISEST).

Genius of the Violin

Violinist Daniel Gervais, national fiddling champion 2012 and laureate of many performance awards and recording prizes is a Master's student in the Department of Music. He is the lead violinist of the celebrated gypsy jazz ensemble, "Hot Club of Edmonton", which specializes in the music of Stephane Grappelli and Django Reinhardt. He is joined today by violinist Guillaume Tardif, professor in charge of "The Genius of the Violin" project and master guitarist Clinton Pelletier.

"The Genius of the Violin" is the name of these musicians' project, an idea of a concert collaboration that started here at the University, and is becoming a video documentary and educational web application – thanks to a SSHRC grant. For this project, the musicians set up a journey across musical styles, following the traces of a creative genius that spans some 450 years, in a diverse world that has often celebrated, danced and sung to a violin's tune. In particular, they reflect on the interesting confluences of folk and classical arts, as they draw from and reflect on their Canadian cultural roots.

Julianne Gibbs-Davis and John Davis Sloan Research Fellowships



Julianne Gibbs-Davis, assistant professor (Chemistry), investigates how molecules recognize one another when they are confined. She is breaking new ground by developing a system to detect unique DNA sequences associated with infectious bacteria such as tuberculosis and malaria. Assistant professor (Physics) John Davis is working to understand and control the area between classical physics and quantum mechanics by fabricating exceptional new nanomechanical devices, developing ultra-sensitive techniques to measure them, and cooling these devices to near absolute zero.

David Percy is a Professor in the Faculty of Law and is the Borden Ladner Gervais Chair of Energy Law and Policy. From 2002 to 2009 he served as Dean and Wilbur Fee Bowker Professor of the Faculty of Law. Professor Percy's teaching philosophy is based on taking advantage of the insights that students can provide from their diverse educational backgrounds while gradually ensuring that they acquire the skills necessary to understand the discipline of law. Professor Percy has always been motivated to conduct research that has an impact on solving real issues of law and policy. He has pursued this interest in a research program that focuses on water and energy. He wrote *The Framework of Water Rights Legislation in Canada*, as well as books on wetlands and ground water.

Professor Percy has been the recipient of several outstanding awards including the W.P.M. Kennedy Award for outstanding merit as a law teacher in Canada (1995); the Rutherford Award for Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching (1996); Tevie H.Miller Teaching Excellence Award (2000); and the Alberta Centennial Medal (2005). He served as inaugural Chair of the University of Alberta Water Initiative and the Faculty of Law Centenary Committee.
