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FIVE TAKEAWAYS FROM "QUERIDA AMAZONIA"

Pope Francis has issued a document -"Querida Amazonia," or "Beloved Amazon" – summing up last October's Synod of Bishops for the Pan-Amazonian Region. Here are five takeaways:

First, Francis dreams of a region that fights for "the rights of the poor," especially of those of the "original peoples" of the area. The pope takes aim at the businesses, both national and international, that harm the Amazon and fail to respect the rights of the original peoples.

Second, Pope Francis notes that the globalized economy often endangers or threatens "human, social and cultural richness." Francis hopes for a world and a church that will recognize, nourish, protect and celebrate the distinctive cultural riches of the Amazon.

Third, the pope reminds us that "the care of people and the care of ecosystems are inseparable." The Amazon is not merely as a place of industry or a place where one can withdraw natural resources. Rather, the equilibrium of the planet "depends on the health of the Amazon region."

Fourth, reflecting on the church in the Amazon, the pope repeatedly stresses "inculturation." The Gospel message must always be announced in new ways to new cultures, and in proclaiming the Gospel, the church "constantly reshapes her identity through listening and dialogue with the people, the realities and the history of the land in which she finds herself."

Finally, the pope examines questions surrounding the Eucharist. There are remote places in the region where the Eucharist is rarely celebrated because of the lack of a priest. So Francis asks for greater participation of laypeople, for example, in "exercising the pastoral care" of parishes, but stops short of calling for the ordination of experienced married men, or the ordination of women as deacons.
