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Course Description and Objectives:

In this course, we will explore Ukrainian Canadian culture, focusing on the time period before 1930. In particular we will develop a curriculum for an ideal online undergraduate course on this subject. We will explore a number of previous courses in this subject matter, critically examine learning objectives for students of this future class, assemble resource materials and prioritize them according to their suitability and their role in producing a balanced curriculum. The main project will be to create a portfolio of digital and/or printed materials constituting such a curriculum.

By the end of this course, successful students will be able to communicate in an articulate way about past and potential curricula for an undergraduate course in early Ukrainian Canadian culture, to explain benefits and challenges of diverse curricular options and preferences.

The first installment of the curriculum portfolio will present an overall plan for the course curriculum, reviewing past course curricula in this and related fields, making an argument for and against including diverse units in the imagined course, reviewing options for technological platforms, considering blended delivery, and other macrolevel recommendations for such a course.

The second installment of the curriculum portfolio will present more micro-scopic recommendations, detailing specific resources and readings for each planned unit, particular assignment ideas, etc.
