ELIGIBILITY

BEGINNERS	 Neither parent of the contestant is a native speaker of Japanese. The contestant has studied Japanese for less than 130 hours or one year. The contestant has not stayed in Japan for more than three months in total since the age of six.
INTERMEDIATE	 Neither parent of the contestant is a native speaker of Japanese. The contestant has studied Japanese for up to 260 hours. The contestant has not stayed in Japan for more than six months in total since the age of six.
ADVANCED	 Neither parent of the contestant is a native speaker of Japanese. There is no limit on the hours of study. The contestant has not stayed in Japan for more than three years in total since the age of six.
OPEN	 Both or either of the parents may be native speakers of Japanese language as long as the contestant is studying Japanese as a foreign language. There is no limit on the hours of study. There are no restrictions on length of stay in Japan.
